The Direct Method

(Definition): According to the Direct Method, meaning is to be conveyed directly in the target language through the use of demonstration and visual aids, with no recourse to the students' native language.

Q/ why did the Direct Method appear?

A/ It appeared as a reaction against the Grammar-Translation Method that was not very effective in preparing students to use the target language communicatively.

Q/ what is the *objective* of the Direct Method?

A/ preparing students to use the target language communicatively.

Q/ What is the basic rule of the Direct Method?

A/ No translation is allowed.

The Principles of the Direct Method

- **1. Reading**: the *reading* skill will be developed through practice with speaking. Language is *primarily speech*.
- **2. Writing**: Writing is an important skill, to be developed from the beginning of language instruction.
- **3.** *Pronunciation is emphasized*: Pronunciation should be worked on right from the beginning of language instruction.
- **4.** *Culture*: Culture consists of more than the fine arts (e.g. the students study geography and the daily life). Learning another language also involves learning how speakers of that language live.
- **5.** *Meaning*: Objects (e.g. realia or pictures) present in the immediate classroom environment should be used to help students understand the meaning.
- **6.** *No native language*: The native language should not be used in the classroom.

- 7. The teacher should *demonstrate*, *not explain or translate*. It is desirable that students make *a direct association between the target language form and meaning*.
- 8. Think in TL & no memorization: Students should learn to think in the target language. Vocabulary is acquired more naturally if students use it in full sentences rather than memorizing word lists.
- 9. Communication: The purpose of language learning is communication
- **10.** Self-correction: Self-correction facilitates language learning
- 11. Conversational activity & encouragement: Lessons should contain some conversational activity—some opportunity for students to use language in real contexts. Students should be encouraged to speak as much as possible.
- **12.***Inductive learning (from general to specific)*: Grammar should be taught inductively. There may never be an explicit grammar rule given.
- **13.** *The syllabus:* The syllabus is based on situations or topics, not usually on linguistic structures.

Reviewing Important questions on The Direct Method (DM)

- 1) What are the role of the teacher?
- Partner: Although the teacher directs the class activities, the student role is less passive than in the Grammar-Translation Method. The teacher and the students are more like partners in the teaching/learning process.
- 2) What is the nature of student-teacher and student-student interaction?

 The initiation of the interaction goes both ways, from teacher to students and from students to teacher, although the latter is often teacher-directed. Students converse with one another as well.
- 3) What areas of language are emphasized? Vocabulary is emphasized over grammar.
- 4) What language skills are emphasized?
